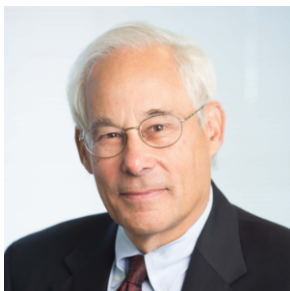


Vineet Arora, MD, MAPP (NAM)

Her work on improving sleep, fatigue and handoffs was influential in improving working conditions for residents. She previously served on the board of the ABIM and currently serves on the boards of Costs of Care, the Joint Commission and the Journal of Hospital Medicine for the Society of Hospital Medicine.

Dr. Cervantes is a member of the American Society for Clinical Investigation and a member of five civic and community boards. She has received numerous accolades for her research and community service, including the 2024 Bernard Lown Award for Social Responsibility.

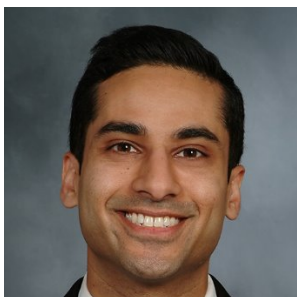


Joel Thorp Katz, MD, MA, MACP

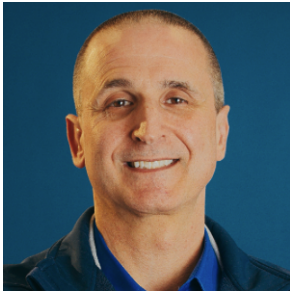


Kevin Schulman, MD, MBA
