Medical Debt Convening Participant Bios



Richard J. Baron, MD, MACP, board certified in internal medicine and geriatric medicine, is President and Chief Executive Officer of the American Board of Internal Medicine and the ABIM Foundation. He was a former Chair of the American Board of Internal Medicine's Board of Directors and served on the ABIM Foundation Board of Trustees. Dr. Baron practiced general internal medicine and geriatrics for almost 30 years at Greenhouse Internists, P.C., located in Philadelphia. Greenhouse was a pioneer in the comprehensive adoption of electronic health records in the small-practice environment. Following that, from 2011 to 2013, he served as Group Director of Seamless Care Models at the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services Innovation Center, where he led efforts related to accountable care organizations and primary care. Until joining the federal government, Dr. Baron also served on the board of the National Quality Forum and their Health Information Technology Advisory Committee, as well as the Standards Committee of the National Committee for Quality Assurance. Dr. Baron served as Chief Medical Officer of Health Partners, a not-for-profit Medicaid HMO set up by four teaching hospitals in Philadelphia, from 1988 to 1996. He was the architect of the Best Clinical and Administrative Practices program, funded by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the Center for Health Care Strategies, working with medical leadership of Medicaid health plans around the country in learning collaboratives to improve the quality of care for their members. This program reached plans serving more than half of the Medicaid managed care population in the United States. He is currently a member of the Aspen Institute Health Strategy Group. Dr. Baron received a bachelor's degree in English from Harvard College and his medical degree from Yale University. He completed house staff training at New York University-Bellevue Medical Center and served a three-year commitment in the National Health Service Corps in rural Tennessee.



Richard G. Battaglia, MD, FACP, a board certified internist, is Chief Medical Officer of the American Board of Internal Medicine (ABIM). There, he leads ABIM's effort to incorporate feedback from practicing physicians and key stakeholders into clinical aspects of all ABIM activities, including Certification and Maintenance of Certification (MOC). Previously, Dr. Battaglia served as a primary care internist with Health Care Plan/Univera, a multispecialty, staff model practice in Western New York, before transitioning into leadership roles, including Medical Director of the Medical Centers Division and Senior Vice President, Medical Affairs/Corporate Medical Director. He also served as Medical Director/Chief Medical Officer of large multispecialty medical groups in Western New York. He has participated in national quality initiatives focused on physician group practice and health maintenance organizations. For more than 10 years, he devoted time to The National Committee for Quality Assurance, including a term as Chairman of the committee charged with accreditation decision-making. Most recently, he was a consultant for national and international organizations, including academic medical centers, health systems, community hospitals, medical groups, payers, and national physician certification organizations. Dr. Battaglia received a biochemistry degree from Canisius College, a Jesuit institution in Buffalo, NY. He obtained his medical degree from the University of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry. Dr. Battaglia completed his residency through the University of Rochester Primary Care Program in Internal Medicine and also served as Chief Resident.



Donald M. Berwick, MD, MPP, FRCP, KBE, is President Emeritus and Senior Fellow at the Institute for Healthcare Improvement (IHI), an organization he co-founded and led as President and CEO for 19 years. He is one of the nation's leading authorities on health care quality and improvement. In July 2010, President Obama appointed Dr. Berwick to the position of Administrator of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS), which he held until December 2011. A pediatrician by background, Dr. Berwick has served as Clinical Professor of Pediatrics and Health Care Policy at the Harvard Medical School, Professor of Health Policy and Management at the Harvard School of Public Health, and as a member of the staffs of Boston's Children's Hospital Medical Center, Massachusetts General Hospital, and the Brigham and Women's Hospital. He has also served as vice chair of the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force, the first "Independent Member" of the Board of Trustees of the American Hospital Association, and chair of the National Advisory Council of the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality. He is an elected member of the American Philosophical Society, the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and the National Academy of Medicine (formerly the Institute of Medicine). Dr. Berwick served two terms on the IOM's governing council, was a member of the IOM's Global Health Board, and currently chairs the NAM Board on Health Care Services. He served on President Clinton's Advisory Commission on Consumer Protection and Quality in the Healthcare Industry. His numerous awards include the 2007 William B. Graham Prize for Health Services Research, the 2006 John M. Eisenberg Patient Safety and Quality Award, and the 2007 Heinz Award for Public Policy. In 2005, he was appointed Honorary Knight Commander of the British Empire by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, the highest honor in the UK for non-UK citizens. He is the author or co-author of over 200 scientific articles and six books. He also now serves as Lecturer in the Department of Health Care Policy at Harvard Medical School.



Shannon Bishop-Green is a Vice President at McCabe Message Partners, where she leads communications and brand strategy for medical boards, health care foundations, and advocacy groups. Her recent work includes communicating the value of board certification, developing communications strategies to mitigate medical misinformation, and bringing together leaders in advocacy and health care to build anti-racist health systems. Prior to joining McCabe, Ms. Bishop-Green led marketing efforts and managed quality improvement campaigns for the American Medical Group Association and its foundation. She began her career at a global PR agency supporting federal public health campaigns.



Maureen Bisognano is President Emerita and Senior Fellow at the Institute for Healthcare Improvement (IHI), an independent not-for-profit organization helping to lead the improvement of health care throughout the world. Previously, Ms. Bisognano served as IHI's Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer, leading IHI along with former President and CEO Dr. Donald Berwick for 15 years. She is a prominent authority on improving health care systems, whose expertise has been recognized by her elected membership to the National Academy of Medicine, among other distinctions. Ms. Bisognano advises health care leaders around the world, is a frequent speaker at major health care conferences on quality improvement, and is a tireless advocate for change. She serves on the Boards of the Commonwealth Fund, Indiana University Health and Nursing Now.



Asaf Bitton, MD, MPH, is the executive director of Ariadne Labs, a health systems innovation center at Brigham and Women's Hospital and the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health. He is an Associate Professor of Medicine and Health Care Policy at both Harvard Medical School and the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health. He leads Ariadne Labs' efforts to design, test, and spread scalable solutions that make domestic and global health systems more safe, equitable, and integrated. He has served as a senior advisor for primary care policy at the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Innovation since 2012, helping to design and implement five major primary care initiatives (CPC, CPC+, PCF, MCP, PC FLEX), representing the largest tests of combined primary care payment and clinical practice transformation work in the United States. He was a core founder and vice chair of the steering committee for the Primary Health Care Performance Initiative, an 8year partnership that included more than 25 countries and the World Bank, the World Health Organization, UNICEF, The Global Fund, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, and others, dedicated to improving the global provision of primary health care. Dr. Bitton practices primary care at Brigham and Women's South Huntington clinic, a team-based community primary care practice in Boston that he helped found in 2011. He currently serves on the boards of the National Committee for Quality Assurance and for Health Leads. He is a member of the Center for Strategic and International Studies Bipartisan Commission on Strengthening America's Health Security and the National Advisory Committee for Advancing a Healthier Wisconsin and is an elected member of the International Academy of Quality and Safety. He formerly served on the National Advisory Council for Healthcare Research at AHRQ. He was a member of the National Academies committee that produced Implementing High-Quality Primary Care: Rebuilding the Foundation of Health Care in 2021, and currently serves on the National Academies Standing Committee for Primary Care. He is a recipient of the 2023 Barbara Starfield Primary Care Leadership Award.



Odette Bolano, FACHE, MHA, BSN, the CEO of West Region, Trinity Health – Idaho | Oregon | California, provides executive leadership and strategic and operational oversight for a 996-bed, 5-hospital region, a 40-bed acute rehabilitation joint venture with 87 clinics and 2 freestanding Emergency Departments, a Clinically Integrated Network across Idaho, Oregon, and California, and 10 other joint ventures. The West Region employs more than 9,000 colleagues, which includes more than 670 Primary Care and Specialty Care medical providers. Immediately prior to this role, from 2018-2023, she served as President & CEO of Saint Alphonsus Health System for Idaho and Oregon, and from 2015-2018, she served as President of Saint Alphonsus Regional Medical Center. Ms. Bolano has been in senior leadership health care positions in for-profit, non-profit, and fully integrated health systems. Prior to joining Saint Alphonsus, Ms. Bolano served as Senior Vice President of Kaiser Permanente, East Bay in Oakland. Prior to Kaiser, Ms. Bolano served in a number of senior executive positions with Ascension Health and HCA. Ms. Bolano began her career as a nurse, receiving her Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Texas Christian University. She earned her Master's in Administration of Healthcare Services from the University of Houston, Clear Lake. She is a Fellow of the American College of Healthcare Executives. An active civic and community leader, Ms. Bolano serves as Chair-elect of the Idaho Hospital Association and the Boise Metro Chamber of Commerce, and serves on Boise Valley Economic Partnership (BVEP), Idaho Business for Education (IBE), Boise State University Foundation Board, and Boise State University College of Health Sciences Board of Ambassadors. Ms. Bolano is an active member of the Carol Emmott Fellowship Board – a national organization committed to mentoring exceptional health care women leaders to achieve their highest potential and influence as leaders in health care. In 2020, Ms. Bolano was appointed as a Board of Director to Idaho Power and IDACORP. Most recently, in July 2022, Ms. Bolano was appointed to the ABIM Foundation Board of Trustees. She has been recognized by Modern Healthcare as one of the nation's most influential 50 Clinical

Executives in Healthcare in 2020 and as a Top 25 Women Healthcare Executives in 2020 and 2021. In 2021 and 2022, Ms. Bolano was recognized as one of the Top 100 Most Influential People in Healthcare. In Idaho, Ms. Bolano has been honored as a TWIN (Tribute to Women & Industry) award recipient, recognized by the Idaho Business Review (IBR) as CEO of Influence, and received an ICON Award. She was one of 50 Women of the Year honorees in 2019 and Woman of the Year in 2021, and #1 in Idaho Business Review's Power 25 List that names the region's most influential men and women in health care in 2020. In her free time, Ms. Bolano enjoys traveling, reading, and spending time with her family.



Samantha (Sami) Bunk, JD, is a Health Policy Strategist at the Missouri Foundation for Health. Ms. Bunk's career and passion for health and law stem from her personal experiences with the health care system. As a Healthy Policy Strategist at the Missouri Foundation for Health (MFH), she leads and supports various projects related to maternal health, reproductive justice, and various other health policy initiatives, including spearheading new efforts to address medical debt in Missouri. Before joining the MFH team, Ms. Bunk spent six years at Legal Services of Eastern Missouri, Inc., holding various roles focused on assisting low-income pregnant women, children and families with health care access. Additionally, she served as a consultant with the Center for Budget and Policy Priorities through its Consumer Assistance Coordination Hub (CACH). Ms. Bunk earned a B.A. in political science from Southern Illinois University- Edwardsville. In 2016, she earned her J.D. with a concentration in health law from St. Louis University School of Law, where she later served as an adjunct professor, teaching grassroots health care advocacy. She also founded the First Generation Society (formerly known as First Chair Society) at SLU Law, a student organization providing support, networking, and mentoring opportunities for first-generation law students like herself.



Roger Bush, MD, received his Doctor of Medicine from the University of California, San Francisco in 1980 and completed residency in Internal Medicine in 1983 at Virginia Mason (VM) Medical Center in Seattle. After working in rural private practice in the Pacific Northwest, he practiced General Internal Medicine at Virginia Mason for 23 years. He assumed a leadership role in the VM internal medicine residency in 1993, serving as Associate Program Director and Program Director. From 2013-2016 Dr. Bush served as founding Program Director for a new primary care internal medicine residency program at Billings Clinic. He sees patients at Pike Market Medical Clinic, a FQHC, and is Associate Program Director of another new Internal Medicine Residency in Everett, WA, focused on preparing general internists for primary care practice in rural and underserved communities, sponsored by Washington State University Elson S Floyd College of Medicine. He is a Technical Advisor for Rural Residency Program Development, a HRSAfunded effort to launch rural GME programs'. Bush served on the Residency Review Committee for Internal Medicine (RRC-IM), appointed by the American College of Physicians. He chaired the Educational Innovation Project subcommittee of RRC-IM, a multi-year effort to change from process-based to outcomes-based accreditation and collaboratively align educational and quality of care outcomes. Dr. Bush served on the Board of Commissioners of the Joint Commission, 2011-2019, where he chaired the Achieving High Reliability in Healthcare Strategic Interest Workgroup, and served on the Standards and Survey Procedures, Performance Measurement, and Governance Committees. Since 2015 he has been a Director for the American Board of Internal Medicine, in addition to serving as a member of its (General) Internal Medicine Specialty Board, 2014-2019. Dr. Bush's core professional interest is the design and implementation of clinical microsystems around the needs and preferences of patients, with education integrated in the daily work. As a member of the physician leadership team at VM and the Billings Clinic, he has been a strong proponent of waste elimination, the integral role of

education in quality and safety, and relationship-based, patient-centered care. He observed the Toyota Global Production System in practice at Hitachi air conditioning, Toyota Automotive, and at Toyota supplier factories in Japan. Dr. Bush led and participated in several kaizen events, using lean management tools to reward clinical faculty, reduce interruptions of clinical work, eliminate extended duty hours, and integrate resident and faculty schedules. Aside from medicine, Dr. Bush is interested in stories, running, family, bird dogs, sailing, and eating well—and he also bakes a wicked fruit pie. Dr. Bush and his wife, Heidi, have two grown children—an online advertising tech worker and a geophysicist. Dr. Bush serves the ABFM on the Examination Committee, the Engagement & Communication Committee, and the Certification Committee.



Steve Butterfield is Senior Director of State Public Policy at The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society. As a former state legislator and a national expert on health coverage, care access, and affordability, Steve provides LLS with research and analysis on state-level policy proposals. Steve also provides the organization with topical expertise in several key focus areas, including medical debt, coverage and benefit mandates, and commercial-market insurance reforms. Steve holds dual masters in public policy from Central European University and the Institut Barcelona d'Estudis Internacionales, where he was an Erasmus Mundus fellow.



Judi Cassel, MPP, works within the President's Office as the Chief of Staff of the American Board of Internal Medicine. In that role, she has direct responsibility for overseeing ABIM's Human Resources; Governance; Customer Care; Strategy, Planning and Optimization; and Program Operations sections. She serves as a key representative of Dr. Richard Baron, ABIM's President and CEO, and helps to develop and implement ABIM's programmatic goals. Ms. Cassel also supports communication among all of ABIM's leadership team members, chairing the Senior Executive Team. Additionally, she acts as liaison to outside legal counsel and serves as ABIM's Chief Ethics Officer, ensuring adherence to ABIM's conflict of interest policies for governance members and staff. Before coming to ABIM, Ms. Cassel worked for the City of Philadelphia as Project Director, OnePhilly, where she led the \$40 million transformation of the City's human resources operations, which serves more than 28,000 active and 35,000 retired employees. She also served the City as Chief of Staff to the Finance Director, where she helped to lead the City's financial operations and set financial strategy for the City. Prior to that, Ms. Cassel served the City of Philadelphia as Chief of Staff of the Department of Human Services and as a Deputy Managing Director. Earlier in her career, she was Deputy Chief Strategic Planning Officer for the School District of Philadelphia. Ms. Cassel graduated from Dartmouth College and has a master's degree in Public Policy from Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government. She also completed a fellowship at the Education Policy & Leadership Center in Harrisburg, PA.



Frederick P. Cerise, MD, MPH, is the President and Chief Executive Officer of Parkland Hospital & Health System. Prior to joining Parkland in 2014, Dr. Cerise served as Associate Dean for Clinical Affairs at the Louisiana State University Health Sciences Center. From 2007 to 2012, he was Vice President for Health Affairs and Medical Education of the Louisiana State University System. Dr. Cerise also served as Secretary of the Louisiana Department of Health and Hospitals from 2004 to 2007. He earned his Medical Degree at Louisiana State University in New Orleans and completed a residency in Internal Medicine at the University of Alabama in Birmingham. In 2011, he earned a Master of Public Health degree from Harvard University School of Public Health. He is a member of the Kaiser Commission on Medicaid and the Uninsured and has served on the Louisiana Federal Health Care Reform Steering Committee and the Louisiana Health Care Quality Forum, among others.



David L. Coleman, MD, a board certified internist and infectious diseases specialist, is a Research Professor and Interim Director at the Yale Center for Clinical Investigation and an Emeritus Professor at the Yale University School of Medicine. He has had a long-standing interest in basic mechanisms of macrophage function and the role of cytokines in regulating host defenses. His recent work has focused on medical professionalism in medical education and clinical practice. Prior to assuming his current position, Dr. Coleman was the John Wade Professor and Chair of the Department of Medicine at the Boston University School of Medicine and Physician-in-Chief at Boston Medical Center. Earlier in his career, he was Chief of Medical Service at the VA Connecticut Healthcare System and Interim Chair of the Department of Medicine at Yale University School of Medicine. Dr. Coleman is a fellow of the American College of Physicians and is the Chair of the ABIM Foundation Board of Trustees. A graduate of Stanford University, Dr. Coleman completed his medical degree at the University of California at San Francisco. He was a resident and fellow in the Department of Internal Medicine at Yale University and Yale-New Haven Hospital, where he also served as Chief Resident.



Jill Duncan, RN, MS, MPH, Vice President, Institute for Healthcare Improvement (IHI), oversees IHI's portfolio of strategic networks. She leads IHI's US-based Leadership Alliance and is accountable to the success of global teams in catalyzing and accelerating improvement knowledge exchange through robust relationship-based networks across IHI communities. Ms. Duncan is an active partner, facilitator, and advisor to large-scale efforts focused on leadership, workforce well-being, clinical quality improvement, and the development of dynamic learning networks. Her previous IHI responsibilities include daily operations and strategic planning for the IHI Open School, leadership for a number of results-oriented initiatives, and the design and development of workforce development programming. Ms. Duncan draws from her learning as a Clinical Nurse Specialist, quality leader, nurse educator, and front-line care provider. She received her undergraduate nursing degree from Georgetown University and her Master of Science and Master of Public Health from the University of Illinois Chicago.



Susan Edgman-Levitan, PA, is Executive Director of the John D. Stoeckle Center for Primary Care Innovation at Massachusetts General Hospital, a lecturer in the Department of Medicine, Massachusetts General Hospital (MGH), an Associate in Health Policy, Harvard Medical School, and an Instructor, Harvard Chan School of Public Health. She was the co-chair of the Patient Experience Leaders Committee at MassGeneralBrigham Health System for 13 years and leads the patient/clinician engagement work for the MGH Palliative Care Continuum Project. Prior to MGH, Ms. Edgman-Levitan was the founding President of the Picker Institute. A constant advocate of understanding the patient's perspective on health care, she has been the co-principal investigator on the Harvard Consumer Assessment of Healthcare Providers and Systems (CAHPS) study and is a member of the Lucian Leape Institute at the Institute for Healthcare Improvement (IHI) and Senior Fellow at IHI. She is an editor of Through the Patient's Eyes, a book on creating and sustaining patient-centered care, The CAHPS Ambulatory Improvement Guide, and many other publications. Ms. Edgman-Levitan serves on several boards and national advisory committees, including the ABIM Foundation, the AHRQ National Advisory Council, the Primary Care Collaborative, and the Patient Experience Policy Forum. She received the Leadership and Innovation Award from the Center for Information Therapy, the 2016 Inaugural Richard Nesson Award from the Massachusetts Health Quality Partnership and the MassGeneralBrigham Nesson Award for System Collaboration in 2020, and she is an invited member of the Future of Health International Collaborative. Ms. Edgman-Levitan holds degrees from the University of Michigan and the Duke University Physician Associate program, where she received the Distinguished Alumni Award and was inducted into the Duke University Medical Center Hall of Fame in 2004.



Margaret Flinter, APRN, PHD, FAAN, FAANP, is the Senior Vice President and Clinical Director of the Moses Weitzman Health System (www.MWHS1.com) and its Community Health Center, Inc. (www.CHC1.com). She has been a board-certified family nurse practitioner since 1980. She earned her BSN from the University of Connecticut, MSN from Yale University, and PhD from the University of Connecticut. After her initial years of practice in public health nursing, Ms. Flinter completed her MSN in community health/ family nurse practitioner track at the Yale School of Nursing. A National Health Service Corps (NHSC) scholar, she joined the Community Health Center in 1980 as a primary care provider and its first nurse practitioner. She fully embraced its founding (1972) commitment to health care as a right, not a privilege and its zest for innovation, growth, and collaboration. At CHCI, she has held both clinical and executive leadership roles as she co-led its growth from a single site to a statewide organization and one of the largest FQHCs in the U.S. In 2023, CHCl created the Moses-Weitzman Health System as the parent organization of CHCI as well as three other subsidiary organizations, each created by CHCI as an innovation to address specific challenges in health care (Community eConsult Network (CECN), the National Institute for Medical Assistant Advancement (NIMAA) and the Consortium for Advanced Practice Providers (CAPP). She has led local, state and national initiatives focused on improving access to the highest quality primary care, particularly for underserved and key populations. In 2005, Ms. Flinter established the Weitzman Center, now known as the Weitzman Institute, as the research, innovation, and training arm of CHCI and currently serves as senior faculty of the Institute. One of her initial projects under the Weitzman Center was the development and launch (2007) of a model of formal postgraduate residency and fellowship training for new nurse practitioners. Now a national model, Ms. Flinter serves as the Chairperson of the Consortium for Advanced Practice Providers, which accredits and advocates for NP and NP/PA postgraduate training programs. She has served as PI/co-PI on numerous funded initiatives with a current focus on clinical workforce development, improving maternity outcomes, and optimizing virtual care. Ms. Flinter is also the co-host of "Conversations on Health Care", a radio show and podcast about health reform, innovation and policy. Ms.

Flinter was the recipient of a Robert Wood Johnson Executive Nurse Fellowship from 2002-2005. In 2021, she was honored with Yale University's Jefferson Award for public service. She is a Fellow of the American Academy of Nursing and the American Academy of Nurse Practitioners.



Deirdre Flynn, MBA, has held finance, strategy, and operations roles working across a broad range of social service, consulting, and finance organizations primarily focused on healthcare services. She currently works as a Senior Healthcare Payment and Finance Advisor at the New York City Department of Health in the Bureau of Equitable Health Systems. Previously Deirdre was a Director at Nonprofit Finance Fund, advising community-based organizations that address social drivers of health on contracting with health systems and payors to serve their clients. She holds an MBA in Healthcare Management.



Kim Freeman is the Executive Assistant to the President and CEO of the American Board of Internal Medicine. Prior to joining ABIM in 2022, she worked for the University of Pennsylvania for over 20 years, holding positions in the School of Nursing, as well as in the Perelman School of Medicine's Department of Medical Ethics and Health Policy, Department of Emergency Medicine and Department of Genetics. Ms. Freeman has a MA of Government Administration from the University of Pennsylvania and a BA of Journalism, Public Relations and Advertising from Temple University.

He also has served as chair of the Right Care Alliance, a grassroots network of clinicians, patient activists, and community leaders organizing to put patients, not profits, at the heart of health care.



Gordon (Gordy) Schiff, MD, is a practicing general internist and Associate Director of Brigham and Women's Center for Patient Safety Research and Practice, Quality Safety Director for the Harvard Medical School (HMS) Center for Primary Care and Associate Professor of Medicine at HMS. Before coming to Boston in 2007, he worked for more than three decades at Cook County Hospital serving Chicago's underserved and uninsured patients, where he directed County's General Medicine Clinic and chaired the Quality Assurance/Improvement and Drug Formulary Committees. He has published more than 250 articles on patient safety and quality, especially in the areas of medication and diagnosis safety. He was a reviewer and contributor to the 2015 National Academy of Medicine Report Improving Diagnosis in Health Care and is a founding member of the Society for Improving Diagnosis in Medicine (SIDM). He has been PI of multiple AHRQ, CRICO, NSPF, and Moore Foundation-funded projects related to improving medication safety and application of health IT to safer medication use. He is currently PI on an AHRQ Diagnostic Center for Excellence focused on learning from and supporting patients with potentially delayed cancer diagnosis. Allison Sesso became the President / CEO of Undue Medical Debt in January 2020. Undue Medical Debt is a nonprofit, charitable institution that relieves medical debt across the U.S., providing financial, physical, and emotional relief to people saddled with medical debt. To date, Undue Medical Debt has erased over \$11.8 billion of medical debt for more than 7.4 million people and counting. Under Ms. Sesso's leadership, Undue Medical Debt has expanded its reach by working with a wide range of health care providers to purchase medical debt, working in partnership with states, counties, and cities on local medical debt relief initiatives, developing its capacity to highlight the impact of medical debt on families, and contributing effectively to the larger conversation around the root causes of medical debt. She has become a prominent voice on the topic of medical debt and is frequently interviewed by media outlets, including CBS Sunday Morning, NPR, the New York Times, and others. Prior to joining Undue Medical Debt, Ms. Sesso served as the Executive Director of the Human Services Council of New York (HSC), an association of 170 nonprofits delivering 90% of human services in New York City. Under her leadership HSC pioneered the development of nationally recognized tools designed to illuminate risks associated with government contracts, including an RFP rater and government agency grading system. She led negotiations with the New York City and New York State governments on behalf of the sector and successfully pushed for over \$500 million in investments to address the nonprofit fiscal crisis. During her tenure at HSC, Ms. Sesso also led a commission of experts focused on social determinants of health and value-basedpayment structures and published the report, Integrating Health and Human Services: a Blueprint for Partnership and Action, that examines the challenges of operationalizing relationships between health and human services providers. She also served on the New York State Department of Health's Social Determinants and Community Based Organizations (CBO) Subcommittee helping to formulate recommendations around the integration of CBOs into Medicaid managed care. Ms. Sesso's work on behalf of the human services sector led City & State to recognize her as a top nonprofit leader in 2018 and 2019, one of the 25 most influential leaders in Manhattan in 2017, and one of New York City's 100 "Most Responsible" in 2016. She again received the 100 "Most Responsible" award for the second time for her efforts at Undue Medical Debt. Under her leadership, in 2022, Undue Medical Debt received the NYC Imagine award for innovation.
